

Robyn explained the similarities between Inner Wheel and Rotary, the International, National and District structure which is based on Friendship, and to raise funds for those in need in the local and international communities. The current theme is "Be a Friend". The Inner Wheel group in the Hills District has 24 members who meet monthly. Robyn left us with the thought:





Travel Update from the Flemings

Hi All Members, It is Friday 13th up here and we are at Leichhardt Lagoon bush camp on the Norman River near Normanton till Sunday 15th. then to Karumba for 2days.

Karumba is on south end of the Gulf of Carpentaria where all the prawning fleets are stationed, just check your road map to see how isolated the town is.

Today really tested us out for this bush camping as it reached 40C at 3pm So being strong city folk we hopped in the Little Car air con ON and off charging through the bush looking for a good fishing spot. As it is The Dry up here the river is low and we saw dozens of Barramundi dead in the water due to low oxygen.

Tonight we are having a three course dinner at the Property Owners homestead and entertained by some of our fellow campers.

Those that enjoy sea food should appreciate it here as there is an abundance of large mud crabs, tiger prawns and barramundi plus lots of crocodiles on the river banks.

Must go as it is XXXX happy hour.

Baker Trip - Final Instalment

As you know, we have been back about 3 weeks now. My mobile broadband packed it in about 4 weeks before we got back and we spent some time with family and friends in Tamworth and Newcastle, so it took a while to get to these through to you. Leave it to you, if and when you want to put them in the bulletin.

In the order in which they have been taken. The first 2 photos are of Mt Isa. Lake Moondara is about 14 km out of town and is very picturesque. The lake is man made, and is in complete contrast of what you expect in this hot dry mining town. The dam was created for the town water supply and is stocked with numerous fish. It has excellent facilities including boat ramps and picnic areas. Wildlife is in abundance and apparently so are the fish. It is very popular with the locals. I took some beautiful sunset photos. The other photo gives you some idea of how the mine influences the town.

The next photos is Jean wrestling with Banjo the dinosaur. This was taken at Winton where they have a couple of very good dinosaur sites. The one we were at here (Australian Age of Dinosaurs) only opened in April and was certainly worth the visit. You can get up close to the reconstruction of these monsters.

We then moved on to Longreach. This is a very historic town. We spent an entire day just at the Stockman's Hall of Fame. Talk about a step back in time. Reminded me of my days in the bush. Most of the exhibits were indoors but they did have a show each day which was great fun. They had stock horses, bullock teams and working cattle dogs. It was very well done. In town they also had Cobb and Co stagecoach rides. Longreach also has the Qantas Founders Museum including a 747, 707 and a Catalina Flying Boat on display outdoors and a whole pile of others indoors. This was also very interesting. In the caravan park in Longreach, we had brolgas wandering around the caravan park being hand fed by the kids.

The next 2 photos are from Bourke. When we arrived in Bourke on Sunday, all of the shops had shutters up to protect all of the glass windows. It was like a different town when the shops were trading. While we were there, the Darling River was flowing strongly after all of the rain. The photo of the old lift bridge that went over the highway, was taken from the Paddle Steamer Jandra. We had a relaxing cruise on the Jandra - again with an abundance of wildlife. The other photo is for the mechanical / engineering / history buffs in the club. It is of a Crossely diesel engine that was originally imported from England to generate power in Sydney. It ended up on a rural property near Bourke and was recently restored. They run it every day for the tourists. It takes about 10 mins just to get it to turn over (all manual). I have quite a number of photos of the engine and a brochure if anybody wants more info.


The next photo is of Lightening Ridge. An interesting place, but very different from Coober Pedy where they also mine Opal. In Lightening Ridge everyone lives above ground as the excavated mines are too moist to live inside. It was a bit difficult to get decent photos here. Our Caravan Park was 200 metres away from the Thermal Pool. Needless to say we spend a few hours relaxing in the mineral water. At our next stop in Moree, the thermal pools were even closer and our van was right alongside. This turned out to be great particularly as the temperatures were starting to fall (significantly).

Our last stop to report was the Warrumbungle's. This is a spectacular landscape. We did a lot of hiking; taking in the mountain peaks and the wildlife. It was our first time there and would like to go back again when it is warmer and spend some time. One part of the park where the picnic areas are was surrounded by kangaroos. Coonabarabran is Astronomy central with the large Anglo Australian telescope and numerous privately owned smaller ones. We had a private night viewing (it was too cold for anyone else) looking at the stars. It gives you some appreciation of how huge the universe actually is.

Anyway that wraps it all up. I hope you enjoy these as much as we enjoyed our trip through Central Australia and Queensland. In all we took about 3500 photos between us. Jean & I are already think about where we will go next – probably WA.




