

This week we had Glen Klatovsky from The Wilderness Society, Sydney, talk about the recent proposal for Woodside to build a LNG "factory" in the pristine Kimberly region, just 40klm north of Broome. The short of it is the proposal isn't going ahead. Glen was very passionate in how he spoke, but also level headed. At the end, he concluded that there are alternate solutions, and one day this gas resource may be harvested (and the "Pilbara syndrome" will be avoided). It was good to see the member interest as was apparent at question time.

We also had Barry Philps of the Rotary Foundation talk for a few minutes on what Foundation does with the funds – a significant part comes back to Club projects as grants. Member donations to Foundation are important, so please try to be a Centurion donor, if you can. I was recognised for becoming a Paul Harris Society member. I figure that because of its leverage, Foundation if the best fund I can donate to, and I do what I can (although I am sort of... retired).

The only activity at present is the Bowel Scan where the kits are available from pharmacies in May. It was good to see all the pamphlets taken by members for letterbox drops – a relief to Barry.

### **Rotary Bowel Scan**

Making healthy choices in our lives is becoming second nature to most, and with medical technology developing so rapidly and made available to us, people are living for longer and have a better quality of life. Unfortunately, bowel cancer is still responsible for thousands of deaths per year.

### The facts:

- Bowel cancer is the 2<sup>nd</sup> most common internal cancer in Australia for both sexes combined and affects 14,000 Australians annually
- It claims the lives of around 4,700 Australians per year
- The good news is that if detected at an early, bowel cancer is the most curable cancer and 90% of these cases have a good outcome
- It is recommended that those over 40 are screened annually to detect any signs of invisible blood in the stool
- More than 75% of people who develop bowel cancer do not have a family history of the disease.

BowelCare is a bowel cancer awareness program, providing an easy and cheap way to test for blood in the stool. Rotary Australia manages distribution of the BowelCare kits to pharmacies and the community. BowelCare is a not-for-profit service. During a month-long campaign in May, the kits are sold at participating pharmacies in the following areas: Sydney, Hawkesbury, Blue Mountains, Southern Highlands, Goulburn, ACT and the NSW South Coast.

### **How BowelCare works**

BowelCare Kits can be purchased at participating pharmacies (please visit <a href="http://www.bowelcare.org.au/">http://www.bowelcare.org.au/</a> for a list of locations). Follow the instructions and simply return the sealed kit to the pharmacy during the allocated time period. The kits are then picked up and delivered to an accredited pathology service for testing. You will be notified of results by your nominated General Practitioner, and confidentiality is maintained at all times. If a test returns a "positive" result, both the patient and their nominated GP are advised to ensure follow up investigation.

Cost: \$10 per kit

Pharmacy Sales: Saturday 4th May 2013 to Saturday 1st June 2013

Last day for returning kits for pathology testing: Saturday 15th June 2013
