Presidents Report 2021-22

I will be the first of many to suggest that Covid19 had a significant impact on Club activities this past year.

The disappointment of **IPP Rosemary** was palpable, when she realised that we would not enjoy a Face-to-Face Changeover. After some 4 days, **Rosemary** had accepted the situation, and I was being harried, into organising a Zoom Changeover.

Indeed, the Club held Zoom meetings each Monday until November. We were well supported by **John Caruana**, who sourced several Guest Speakers of note. The most memorable, for me, was **Sharon Eddington**, a Rotary Peace Scholar, talking from Republic of Georgia.

From November we needed to coordinate with Springfield House, as that facility was in high activity reducing the backlog of deferred weddings.

We also started "Cheese & Crackers" Zoom meetings on Friday nights, to talk informally about life, et al, during the Covid19 shutdowns.

We did not hold our annual Trivia Night, and Garage Sale signature fundraising events. The Giant Book Sale was delayed by a month. Overall, we raised some \$36K, and donated some \$41K.

Member donations were outstanding. The Fundraising account received Centurion funds of \$3,600, Flood Relief donations of \$3,150, and "in lieu of flowers" for Stan of \$900.

Clearly, David's quiet talks:

- \checkmark about the benefits of Foundation, and
- ✓ making the Foundation our "charity of choice"
- were effective.

Cawas' Tree of Joy team ran a most successful event collecting Christmas presents at both Cherrybrook Shopping Village, and Westleigh Shopping Village.

- ✓ The value of these Christmas presents would match or exceed the Club's monetary donations.
- ✓ The Street Libraries Project was another success. Tony Makin toiled to produce four libraries and was part of the team installing them.
- ✓ Club donations to Flood Relief exceeded \$10K.





At the start of the year, I suggested to **Peter** that NTA was not yet part of the Club psyche - I can no longer make this suggestion.

Peter's promotion of NTA has been constant and fastidious.

Additionally, the Club joined forces with four other Clubs to hold a Fundraising Dinner. Several Members and Partners contributed time and effort to ensure a successful event. The dinner was enjoyed by all attending and raised \$12K.

Club membership declined by one.

Alex Jugueta joined in August 2021. **Bill Mann** resigned to upgrade a country property. **Stan Baseley** left us to join God's Printers Guild.

Carol's "Bring a Friend" night was a success. I believe we now have three prospective members that may/will join in the new Rotary year.

I commend the Board members, both individually and in concert, for their inputs into making the Club function and serve the communities we serve.

Best wishes to **Janelle**, and her team. Her plans and direction will ensure the Club's continuing success.

COVID-19 had a significant effect on the work of the club during the 21-22 year though at the end we did achieve significant milestones.

1. **ARV Retirement Village** - Support local facility with a BBQ lunch in conjunction with owners of Cherrybrook Shopping Village.

Outcome: Cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions.

2. Tree of Joy - Our annual Christmas Event

Outcome: The Rotary Club of West Pennant Hills and Cherrybrook held its 30th Christmas Tree of Joy to provide joy to some in the community who have little of it at Christmas. The Club combined with the management of the Cherrybrook Shopping Village to place a tree in the village centre. We thank the community for its incredible support again this year.









"Awesome Generosity" is the only way to describe the number of gifts donated by those communities when people selected a tag from the trees and purchased a present for a child or adult as nominated on the card. The members of the Club and their partners and volunteers gathered to sort and label the donated gifts in preparation for them to be sent off to the children and adults who were to benefit. Ten charities: Anglicare, Associated Outreach, Camp Quality, Forster Care, Homicide Victims Support Group. Marayong Public school, Parramatta Mission, Taldumande, Shine for Kids, and Wesley Mission gratefully received the gifts for children and adults who would otherwise have had little joy in their lives at Christmas.

At the Cherrybrook Shopping Village against 1,105 labels displayed we collected 865 gifts achieving 78% which is what we have been achieving over the years.

Westleigh against 238 labels we received 194 gifts achieving 81%.

Combined from various charities that we support we received 1,343 labels incidentally this year was the highest number of labels that we have ever received against which we collected 1,059 achieving a staggering result of 79%. With an average value of \$40/- per gift it would equate to collecting over \$42,000/-We thank the management of Westleigh

Shopping Centre for the opportunity and the pharmacy for providing the collection centre.









3. Street Library



Street Libraries are becoming increasingly popular and our club as a part of Community Service has built and manned 4 of them.

WHAT ARE STREET LIBRARIES - a beautiful home for books, planted in the front yard. They are accessible from the street and are an invitation to share the joys of reading with your neighbours. They are a window into the mind of a community; books come and go; no-one needs to check them in or out. People can simply reach in and take what interests them; when they are done, they can return them to the Street Library network, or pass them on to friends.

If anyone has a book or two that they think others would enjoy, they can just pop it into any Street Library they happen to be walking past.

They are a symbol of trust and hope – a tiny vestibule of literary happiness.

Not only will this help in promoting Rotary, our club but in fostering the love of reading improving literacy especially amongst our youth, building communities and the community spirit by giving the neighbourhood the opportunity to give, borrow and share a book. With

International Service Report 2021-22

Our priority continues to focus our International Service efforts on the strong
ongoing programmes implemented by Nusa Tenggara Association (NTA) / Rotary
Small Grants Projects in Flores and West Timor. The programmes are authentic and
meet the criteria we had set for a sustainable relationship and meeting our
requirements for strong governance.

Three major events we achieved

1 The District Grant Approved. Total \$10,000

<u>"Covid-19 Response to Schools and Rural Communities in Eastern Indonesia"</u> This allowed NTA to roll out COVID messaging and prevention measures quickly and easily including hand washing stations, soap, posters and banners into all of our schools and communities. They also worked with communities and local governments to help NTA supported schools severely impacted by the Cyclone Sejora to bounce back to full capacity.

Nusa Tenggara Association (NTA)

- Celebrated their 30th birthday, successfully implementing programs in Indonesia for 3 decades.
- NTA <u>Indonesia</u>, has shown great capacity and resourcefulness to maintain our activities around the COVID restrictions and while NTA- Australia is unable to visit Indonesia.
- A new program to promote traditional ikat weaving continues to expand and to attract high interest. This is aimed directly at improving livelihoods for women. Sewing machines and training is provided to diversify products, and improve quality and marketing.
- The management systems continue to improve through the development of computerised database systems. NTA-Indonesia now uses tablets (some donated by our club) to record activity progress and photographs and to record answers to questions. This information is uploaded to the cloud providing real time information flow to NTA in Australia.
- NTA work to continuously improve our efforts to protect vulnerable people and to focus greater effort on those in need. We have developed improved systems and are providing training and guidance to our Indonesian counterparts.
- COVID has re-energised and accelerated our efforts in health and sanitation. These are preventative measures not just for





COVID but also for a host of other diseases and health issues prevalent in the region.

2 A <u>Donation of 1000 washable Covid masks</u> was made possible by the generous donation and effort of Wendy Carritt (Probus) and Anne Sharp, Bev Davison (Rotary partners) The donation was greatly appreciated and sent a personal message that we care for the recipients during these difficult Covid times.

3 A Combined Rotary fund raising

dinner was most successful with 141 attendees.

The presentations from Stephanie Heighes and Dignitaries which was much appreciated. The combined participation of our District Governor, 7 North Shore Rotary clubs strengthened the event's profile.

Importantly the attendance by the Sydney Consulate General of

Santos Science Experience

Our connection with Coonabarabran Rotary Club has been enhanced by sponsoring students to this event. 3 girls were all set to attend in September being hosted by members of our club. Again, Covid raised its ugly head, and the girls were offered a one-day online course instead. Having spoken to one of the students it was



disappointing for them to have internet problems due to being on farms and they missed that opportunity. We hope for better things next Rotary year.

Rotaract

The Rotaract club of Pennant Hills and Cherrybrook that we helped to sponsor is struggling and at the time of writing this report looks like folding. It is a great shame, but we wish the former members success in further endeavours.

Youth Nights

Youth nights are a highlight of our Rotary year, and we held both via Zoom in November and February.

In November, Kishaya and Sasha were introduced to the club for RYLA, Harishan for NYSF and Amanda Barnes from District spoke about Youth programs especially in the Blue Mountains.

In February, Harishan reported on his NYSF experience, and the delightful Winnie Yip from District spoke about the Rotary Youth Exchange program and when that program would be recommencing.

Local Schools

We like to work with our local schools however no excursions etc meant there was no need for discretionary funds to Principals.
