And that is what I will be urging all Rotarians to do in the year 2002-03: ***Sow the Seeds of Love*** — in your clubs, in your vocations, in your communities, and everywhere in our world.

- ❑ There has been a need identified for the establishment of a new Probus Club in our Area and we are looking at the possibility of Chartering a new Club in the West Pennant Hills Area.
- ❑ We will be running our two stalwart fundraisers in the Garage Sale and the Trailer Raffle but we are aiming to start another new fundraising front which we can hopefully develop into a major contributor over the coming years.
- ❑ We also have a few new ideas for fellowship activities which Ross and his committee will be rolling out over the year. Look out for these, they will be fun.
- ❑ In addition to our established programmes, we are also developing new initiatives in Youth, Community, International and Vocational. These are outlined in more detail in the respective areas of the Club plan. Check them out.

All in all, we are looking for another busy and fun year and, with all your support, I am sure we will manage to lay another solid and unique block in the character building process of this great club.
