Bowelscan Program

The Rotary Bowelscan kits are available from participating pharmacies as part of this year's Rotary Bowel Cancer Awareness Campaign, which runs from March 6th to April 3, 2010.

The Sydney/Central Coast Bowelscan programmes have been conducted by the Rotary Club of East Gosford for the past 20 years. Results for last year's Programme (to date) have detected 26 cancers and 79 polyps in people who were unaware of their problem.

The test is used to detect invisible blood in the stool, which if present may indicate a cancer or polyp. A positive test does not necessarily mean cancer - there may be another reason.

The Rotary Bowelscan kits sell for only \$10.00, and includes testing by an LAVERTY PATHOLOGY and notification of all results.

The kit is used in the privacy of your home, and when completed must be returned to a participating pharmacy before April 16th, 2011.

We will be promoting the program at Cherrybrook Village from March 7th until March 18th and I will be looking for volunteers from the Club or their partners to sit at our table and either sell kits and/or hand out literature on morning or afternoon shifts. (This is a good chance to catch up on your reading)

Feedback from our Tree of Joy

From Wesley Family Services North West Sector.

During the pre-Christmas weeks the Family Workers at Hills Family Centre were the bearers of very good news to many of our families who were looking at a bleak Christmas and were struggling to provide even small gifts for their children. As we went through the families we support and made contact to say we had parcels for them, the response was very touching. Many tears were shed at the thought that the general community would be so generous to donate the gifts that their family received.

One such family is a single Mum who has three children and has spent the last 18 months trying to provide safe, secure housing, find employment, contend the Family Court and mend the souls of her children and herself from a violent relationship perpetrated by the partner who was supposed to love and care for them all. She was overwhelmed by the support and thought that she now had presents for Santa to deliver on Christmas morning.

It isn't just the mums and dads who are grateful to the community for their gifts, it's children too. As they come to the Hills Family Centre for appointments we take them to our gift supplies. Being able to watch them make decisions about what

they think mum or dad would like best for Christmas is really special. We help them wrap up their chosen gifts to take home and hide, until being able to present their mum or dad a gift especially for them.

Here are some of the expressions of appreciation from those you have helped :

"It is so great to see such wonderful acts of kindness by complete strangers, it is very touching"

"I cannot thank you and the generosity of the community enough. Now I have presents to give the kids, they are going to be over the moon."

"If it wasn't for all these gifts that I now have for Christmas morning, I don't know how I was going to explain to my children why Santa did not leave any gifts for them."

The following is a letter received from a young mum who has four children. She lives with her partner and children in a very small two bedroom fibro-cement home owned by the Department of Housing. Mum struggles with depression and her partner, a plasterer, injured his back and has been unable to work for most of 2010.

"To Stacey, Tricia and staff at Riverstone Families Connect,

This year has been one of the hardest times we have ever had to endure. With the loss of my father-in-law, my own struggle with depression, then my partner's injury and loss of work, meant we had no choice but to declare personal insolvency. We have never had a worse year putting a lot of hardship and stress on the family.

I am so grateful to have met you ladies as we would never have got through such hard times without your help and support. I was so worried about having to tell my children we didn't have presents or special food for Christmas. Then you arrived at my door with hampers of food and gifts for my children. I am eternally grateful as we would not have been able to give our kids presents or the special food you gave us. I cannot thank you enough for all you have done for us. I can only hope that one day I can return the

kindness and support you have all shown us.
From the bottom of my heart, thank you!.

Best Wishes to you all this Christmas."

From a child and Family worker at Brighter Futures Blacktown:

"I had just given gifts to one of my families and when the little girl opened her gift (it was an animal farm), she was so happy and her mother said that it was the gift she wanted for Christmas.

All I could think is how happy this little girl was and how lucky we are to have the Rotary Club helping these families. As a result, this little girl was blessed with a gift she had asked for at Christmas.

"After delivering gifts, one client texted me on my mobile phone to say : Thank you so much, nobody has ever done this for me before. I can't believe it!"

"Boy's bike given to a boy aged 14

Luay had been given an old bike by the Salvation Army sometime back, but, as it was old it was now unable to be used. Luay's family has very little in the way of finances and possessions.

It was beyond Luay's mother's ability to provide Luay with another bike.

To the person who donated this bike :

I would have liked you to share in the moment that Luay received his bike. The look on Luay's face; Absolute joy, wonderment. "This bike is for you Luay,"

Luay ran his hands all over the bike looking at it.

Luay spends a lot of time riding his bike. He gets a lot of enjoyment from it riding it around his neighbourhood.

Thank you to all that have sent their thoughts We really appreciate it.

Mum and the rest of our rellies and friends are not physically hurt. Mum was very shaken and still is, as you can imagine any 93 year would be. Mum has to use bottled water (It's delivered in bulk so everyone has to fill available containers. No showering) At least she can make a cup of tea as power came on to their complex much later that day. There was a big day of celebration in the village last Friday as they had a few porta-loos delivered. Phillip flew over last Saturday. He took Mum and a couple of Aunties back to Buderim on Tuesday. Fancy shepherding 3 90+ year olds back to Australia via Auckland and looking after them for a few weeks. He and his new wife are to be congratulated. He tells me their nerves wouldn't allow them to stay there. About 1/2 the village has left by now.

Most of our friends and relations have damage of some sort to the contents of the house and some have damage to the houses Those in the north and west were better off (power, water, sewerage, damage) than those in the east and south. A Lot of ChCh had to rely on Wee and Poo buckets and holes in the garden for toilet facilities. It's not really surprising but many of family and friend are either staying with someone else or have someone staying with them

Two different stories

We have 3 friend and family who live on the hills between ChCh and Lyttelton. We believe that at least 2 homes may be written off and the other have significant damage. All 3 are evacuated. One couple were able to spend 5 minutes in it before being ordered to leave. Sue's Comment, there is nothing in the house that is not broken or damaged.

A Nephew works for the Power company in an administrative customer service role. As such he had to go into work last week in a Building that is condemned. But he was

allowed past the cordons. On his way to work he had to walk past a flattened car. Inside was a dead person and that stayed like that for a couple of days. (it was very distressing) All resources were deployed trying to find those that might be saved.

There is a still some of ChCh that doesn't have power and a lot more that don't have water or sewerage. At the time of writing all the schools are still shut.


