RED CENTRE TAG ALONG TOUR - Ross Ballinger

This is more about Rotary than what we saw on the trip. 18 Caravans 35 people The trip started in Queensland at Cubbie Station. Through Lightening Ridge, Bourke, Broken Hill, Flinders Ranges, Coober Pedy, Ayers Rock, Kings Canyon, Alice Springs, Devils Marbles, Tennant Creek, Winton, Longreach, Carnarvon Gorge and finishing at Roma.

We then went on to Birdsville to do a BBQ over 4 days and act as volunteers; marshals for the fun run and waiters at the cocktail party.

We had travelled 11,000k over 7 weeks by the time we got home.

Organised by the Queensland E Rotary Club (Next Gen) to raise funds for the Royal flying Doctor. **What is an E Rotary Club**?:

- It's a club that meets on line. Imagine Skype on steroids
- It's designed to allow members to come together who cannot come to a regular meeting.
- They still have a normal weekly meeting. Fellowship, Rotary Business, a Speaker, and a Sargent (Happy Fines and a "Bugger" Fine. (Everyone makes an annual donation to the foundation of say \$50).
- Based in Gold Coast (Total membership of about 30+ but less than 1/3 are local). Some are overseas. Meet on Wed Evening. Log into "Come to Meeting"
- Members do their own service work. One has written a book and travels around Australia getting work as a nurse and speaking to Rotary and Probus clubs about Pancreatic Cancer. Proceeds of the Book go to the Health Foundation.
- Bunnings BBQ staffed by members and friends of Rotary (e.g. Previous Exchange Students on Facebook)

They are renovating (by supplying labour) houses for the pilots and doctors at flying Doctor Bases throughout Queensland.

• They use Rotary as a resource by partnering with other Rotary clubs and members to staff various projects.

Royal Flying Doctor Service:


