Peter Cleary introduced the guest speaker Detective Inspector (Retired) Hans Rupp who **retired just 10 days ago.**

According to a fascinating article in the Daily Telegraph, he leaves dozens of killers behind bars for life.

Many of his peers called him "iconic", ever humble Inspector Rupp said he is just a dedicated, hardworking and diligent detective. "I'm an accidental police officer because the man over the road from me had just joined the police and he said it's a great job so I went and signed up," he said.

"I have been very proud to be a police officer. There are people in jail for the rest of their lives because of what I did."

Inspector Rupp spent the past 41 years in the police squad of which 16 years were in Homicide at the sharp end of policing, swapping between the robbery and homicide squads.

Topic for the evening was "Homicide in Australia" figures are from National Homicide Monitoring Program

- 257 people were murdered Australia wide 175 male and 82 Female
- Since 2001/2012 there has been a downward trend from 1.8 to 1.2 per 100,000 head of population whilst indigenous population is on an increase at 4.1per 100,000 head of population which is a sad indictment.
- Contrary to what the media would like us to believe, homicide with firearms continuous to decline as they
 have for the past 10 years.
- What is alarming is that 61% of the victims are killed in their homes.
- The major cause of death are
 - Stab wounds 47%
 - Beatings 31%
 - Gun shot 10%
 - Strangulation 2%
- Others 10%
- NSW has 34% of the nation's homicide of which 91% were solved though the actual figures are much higher. Technology has been a huge help especially DNA and finger prints.

• If you are a man aged 20 to 44 stay at home at night and avoid man carrying knives and your chances of being murdered will be greatly diminished.

President Barry put the Visioning to vote and the Aye's got it meeting to be held on Monday 9th March from 06:00pm to 10:00pm.

Next week Youth Night so please bring your partners along it will be a very enjoyable evening Max Henderson won the raffle whilst Peter Cleary won Heads & Tails.


Sergeant Graham closed the meeting not before collecting his rightful dues.




