Rotary International

Our Rotary International 2018-19 President, Barry Rassin's, presidential theme is "Be the Inspiration". The drive to do more, to be more, to create something that will live beyond each of us."

Highlights not covered in the Director Portfolios

We participated in six combined meetings with other Rotary clubs.

- a) Glenhaven joined for two meetings
 - a. In September Glenhaven joined us for a combined normal meeting.
 - b. In October we joined Glenhaven to hear a talk about St Gabriel's School which both clubs support.
- b) In April we achieved our most significant joint meeting with ~ 150 people from twelve clubs from the Norwest, Hills and Upper North Shore Clusters (West Pennant Hills & Cherrybrook (31), Beecroft (18), Berowra (1), Carlingford (23), Castle Hill (4), Dural (11), Epping (7), Glenhaven (8), North Rocks (8), Norwest Sunrise (8, Pennant Hills (15), and Hills-Kellyville (9)) joined us to hear an excellent speaker on the topic of a senior SAS officer serving in the middle east theatre of war.
- c) In May the Pennant Hills Rotary Club, who were the founders Pride of Workmanship of joined us for our award night.
- d) In November, we joined clubs from Norwest, Hills and Upper North Shore zones at a meeting hosted by the Epping Club to hear a debate between a current and past state liberal MP.
- e) In August, we joined with other clubs (Lower Blue Mountains, Hills-Kellyville, Kenthurst, Norwest Sunrise, Castle Hill, Beecroft and Pennant

Hills) for dinner meeting hosted by the Norwest Sunrise Club at Springfield House to celebrate "Service Above Self" and the Norwest Sunrise Medicos in Bolivia project.



We again joined the West Pennant Hill and Cherrybrook Lions Club for their ANZAC commemoration.

Club Health. The strength of our Club comes from the fellowship of its members and my aim for the year was to remain a vibrant Club, one that was doing things and having fun. The membership committee conducted another member satisfaction survey. A twenty-nine response out of our 39 membership is beyond expectation. The Survey essentially followed the Rotary District Club Health format, but using Survey Monkey to run it. Many thanks to Edwina (Rotarian Kerry Mann's PA) for putting the questions into Survey Monkey. Overwhelmingly members were satisfied with the club including the frequency of meetings. Some improvement opportunities were identified and implemented where possible. For example:

- 1) some minor changes to meeting format i.e. no grace and no toast to the Queen;
- 2) a greater representation of the demographic of our area President Colin is currently working toward this opportunity with a local community organisation Australian Community Inspired Association; and
- 3) more hands-on community and international service projects.
- 4) greater recognition of our club in our community President Colin is currently building a club relationship with the Hornsby Council, the Cherrybrook Shopping Centre, the Australian Community Inspired Association, The Federal MP for Berowra, the Cherrybrook Progress Association. Rotarian Carol Russell has continued to get articles about our club activities published in local newspapers and magazines.

We implemented an increase in meal costs due to increased costs imposed by our meeting venue. This also coincided with a change the in administration of attendance.

We ran three Club Assemblies in: July, November and April.

We were represented at District Changeover (4), District Conference (7) and District Assembly (8).

Rotarian Janelle Craig and President Colin participated in the Dare to Ask training program being provided by Lifeline and supported by Julian Leeser (MP for Berowra). Dare to Ask has been developed to equip individuals with the ability to recognise when it is necessary to ask whether someone is thinking about suicide, respond with the appropriate skills and referal to relevant support agencies. Julian Leeser is encouraging organisations to undertake Dare to Ask Training Course. After discussion with Lifeline it is our plan to run a shortened version at a club meeting during 2019-20.

President Colin, Neville Hansen and Brian Furrer met with the Cherrybrook Uniting Church Council to express our appreciation of their cooperation for the use of their garage. A donation was made to their historic church restoration fund. That church is one of two listed historic buildings in Cherrybrook. Discussion also identified families in need and who our Club may be able to assist.

We were asked by District to provide our club's view on our District (9865) continuing to hold discussions with the other Sydney District (9675) regarding voluntarily joining together. Our club supported these discussions, however in a final very close vote by all the clubs in our District these discussions will not continue.

We are participating (along with other local clubs) in the Pennant Hills Club's initiative for a Rotary Opening of the North Connex in 2020. A steering group has been formed to explore the opportunities available to Rotary.



This year saw the passing of Jim Kehoe who was a long-time ex member of our Club. Vale Jim Kehoe.



Helen Ballinger received a Paul Harris Fellow award from the Rotary E Club of Next Gen which is based in the Gold Coast. It was presented at a meeting of the Belmont Rotary club in Perth during a Tag Along caravan trip to WA late last year. The reasons for the PHF as given in the citation were:

Drought Relief

Our signature project for the year was Drought relief. All the proceeds from our Trivia night, the Federal Election Polling Booth barbeque and donation jars at all our events meant we were able to donate \$13,000 to Drought relief. Another \$10,000 was contributed by a club member taking our total to

\$23,000. We chose to make our donation to the Rotary Club of Coonabarabran's Drought Relief Fund which is distributing money and goods-in kind to drought affected families. Our funds went toward their grant program where families applied for a grant up to \$1000. Club members have travelled twice to Coonabarabran to meet with the Rotary club and see why drought relief is required. Another outcome is a strong bond between the two clubs.

Two other club members made anonymous donations direct to the Coonabarabran Club as appreciation of support they have received from the club during the year.

Club members also provided 30 pamper packs for women in distressed families.



Marie Knight, the wife of a drought affected farmer in the Coonabarabran area, started a program called Lamb Jumpers. These jumpers help Merino lambs from mothers suffering drought affects survive. We have co-ordinated

the collection and distribution of jumpers from local Probus Club knitters.

St Gabrielle's School.

Project 1

We celebrated the opening of the shed and sail project completed last Rotary year and have started another project this year at St Gabriel's private school for disabled children to be completed in 2019-20.





Project 2

David and Tony Coote are leading a hands-on project to build a vegetable garden, install a water tank and assemble a garden shed for the garden. The cost of this project is expected to be approximately \$5,000. Thank you to the team who amazingly got stage one (tank and gardens) finished on the first work day









Marayong School.

Last the club funded the installation playground shade sales at Marayong Public School by Rotarian Tom Westcott, however the opening occurred this year.









Tree of Joy. Our Tree of Joy program that is run in conjunction with the Cherrybrook Village Shopping Centre was co-ordinated by Rotarian Jaswant Thakorlal supported by Honorary Rotarian Brian Furrer. Thank you to Bernard who turned up every day to collect the presents from the shopping centre and deliver them to the Turnbull's. Thank you to David and Jill who once again so generously opened up their house for

sorting. We collected around 750 presents which was a about 80% of the baubles put on the tree. This is our normal return and is estimated at a value of around \$40,000. The gifts are distributed to needy people by the charities that participate in the program. Rotarian David was moved to tears when he attended the Wesley Mission thank you event.

Rotary BowelCare. Thank you to Rotarian Teresa Janowski who has worked diligently to run the club's BowelCare program. This year we have only coordinated supply of kits to local pharmacies and not sold them directly to the public at shopping centres.

Red Shield Appeal. We again participated in the Red Shield Appeal collection day which is coordinated in our area by Rotarian Theo Glockemann from the Pennant Hills Club. This year the collection support expanded to include static stalls in shopping centres and Bunnings Stores in the Thornleigh/Pennant Hills area.

ARC Residents Barbeque. We ran another very successful BBQ in conjunction with the management of Cherrybrook Village Shopping Centre for the residents of the Anglican Retirement Centre. About 100 residents attended.

West Pennant Hills Public School's Drought Relief Project. Four club members cooked 700 sausages for the school's Walkathon.

Cherrybrook Public School's International Eventing barbeque in March. Eight club members ran the BBQ.

Ronald McDonald House Meals from the Heart

We cooked and served dinner meals in July and November. Our participation in this project is under review due to new rules and increased costs.





Diabetes Alive

Diabetes Alive is a partnership with Medtronic, Variety – The Children's Charity and the Rotary Club St Ives to provide diabetes pumps to families with children where private health insurance is unaffordable and therefore not entitled to a free government issued pump. Without these pumps the T1DM patients need blood testing 6 times a day and insulin shots 3-4 times a day. Death and extreme suffering occur within either hours or days if the insulin shot is not taken

We contributed \$3000 which was added to \$6,000 from Rotary Foundation/Starlight/Lions Fund) to buy a \$9,000 a Medronic insulin pump for a 4-year-old child with Type 1 diabetes mellitus living in Quakers Hill. The insulin pump injects insulin when food is digested and has a Wi-Fi connection to a carers phone to provide external monitoring.

Mums and Co.

We were invited by the management of the Cherrybrook Village Shopping Centre to participate in a pilot program reading to young children. Thank you to Rosemary for reading and Jaswant for selling some children's books left over from our Booksale.

Save our Kids

This is a project initiated in 2011 by the Rotary Club of North Gosford for suicide prevention. Since then it has had a positive influence on over 500 young people contemplating suicide. There are numerous other programs under the umbrella including

- SAFE Talk
- ASSIST
- Mind Your Sports Mates.
- Top Blokes and Stand Tall.

These programs have been integrated with other Rotary programs such as RYLA and RYPEN. The club has donated \$1000.

Community Support Donations

Donations for this year again focused on Rotary programs, needy schools and underprivileged children and adults. We have consciously moved away from donating to non-rotary charities where our donations go into a general fund and Rotary gets no recognition. 2018 Trivia Night

The 2018 Trivia Night was held on Saturday 25th August and was the best to date with around 240 people attending. Thank you to the community, other Rotary, Lions and Probus clubs who supported us. This year we promoted where the money raised was going and this contributed to the success. We raised around \$7000 gross which all went to the Rotary Club of Coonabarabran's Drought Relief Fund. Grants of up to \$1000 are made to drought affected families for farm input and family living costs.

Steve Sims was once again a fabulous quiz master, with Rotarian Rosemary Clarke doing a great job as MC.



This Trivia night started our Drought Relief project for 2018-19. We chose to work with a country club from a NSW drought affected area. The Coonabarabran Rotary club was chosen through a connection between that club and Rotarian Rosemary Clarke. We were fortunate to be able to add \$10,000 from an anonymous club member to the \$7000 (gross) raised at the Trivia night. In early September President Colin and Anne, Rotarians, Ros and Gino Savio, Andrew and Desley Little and Rosemary and Rob Clark, Peter and Julie Cleary and Exchange student Larissa travelled to Coonabarabran to present the money.

2018 Garage Sale

The 2018 Garage sale was held on Saturday 13th and Sunday 14th October 2018. It rained so the sale was split between the Fire Station site and the Cherrybrook Uniting Church. Despite misgivings about doing this our takings and net profit was on a par with last year. Revenue for the sale days was ~ \$36,000 with a net return of $\sim $27,600$.

The whole Club worked tirelessly for the period of collection & drop off (23rd September to the 15th Oct), and some long before that with preparations.

Neville Hansen (Leader) once again did an outstanding job in project managing the garage sale and was supported by an enthusiastic, hardworking committee.

Whilst it is a lot of very hard work, the fun and camaraderie enjoyed by our members over the weekend shows how rewarding and worthwhile this event is. We would also like to acknowledge the Rural Fire Service, Cherrybrook Girl Guides and the Cherrybrook Uniting Church for the use of their premises. Monetary donations were made to these three organisations to recognise their support. There are many people and organisations that contribute to the running of the garage sale. I thank the following:

- a) For the loan of equipment to run the sale from Bendigo Bank, Equipment Services International, Marayong Public School, Beecroft Rotary, and Yellow Brick Road (Carol Russell);
- b) For promoting the sale; Cherrybrook Public School, Pennant Hills High School, John Purchase Public School, West Pennant Hills Public School, and Cherrybrook Technology High School;
- c) For taking our left over goods; Providential Homes, Wayside Chapel, Salvation Army at Baulkham Hills and Salvation Army at Dural.
- d) Schibello Caffe for making their coffee cart available.
- e) This year Rotarian Peter Cleary was very successful in on-line selling of many items before the event and after the sale. In addition to the on-line sales made before the sale days approximately \$2000 was raised postsale days and is not included in the above figures. Thank you Peter for your efforts.

District Governor Susan made a club visit shortly after the garage sale and we took the opportunity to celebrate the success of the sale and hold a party.

This included a visit by the Club's clowns (2018 District Conference dress-up winners), songs from soprano Georgia, and the traditional handing out of humorous garage sale donation awards. We also received our gnome from PDG John Wakefield to dress up for the 2019 District Conference.



A special fundraising committee under the leadership of Rotarian Neville Hansen was established to review fundraising and make recommendations for next year. It was recommended that the garage sale continue, but the incoming committee should consider their recommended changes. Included was a recommendation to investigate better storage to allow sale items offered to the club to be stored (and repaired if necessary) and sold on-line throughout the year.

President Colin with the help of the Deputy Mayor of Hornsby, has found a site in the Shire Council depot at Galston. It is hoped to have two 40-foot containers placed on that site. The two 20-foot containers at the fire station will be retained.

Toy raffle. In November the Cherrybrook Village Shopping Centre management organised a pop-up stall in the centre for us to run a toy raffle. 


2019 Book Sale

The 2019 book sale was held on Friday 22nd to Sunday 24th March.

Total takings of \sim \$20,000 were significantly above last year resulting in net profit of \sim \$16,700.

The use of the Cherrybrook Uniting Church garage area is gratefully acknowledged. As well as rent for the garage a significant donation was made to the Church Restoration Fund. The church is responsible for maintaining one of Cherrybrook's few historic buildings.

This success was due to the untiring efforts of our Book Sale Committee & our club members and their partners at the three book sorts, and the actual book sale days.



The book sale is a great way for our members to participate in community service to raise funds for well deserving charities and local community projects that are undertaken by our club. We ran 7 Bunnings BBQ's. Bill has picked up the running of the Bunnings BBQ's thanks to the intensive training given by Janelle in buying the provisions and organising volunteers. Thank you to those members who help set up and dismantle the BBQ's and transporting the BBQ equipment to and from the container and more recently the Cherrybrook Uniting Church garage. Thank you to the regular BBQ helpers who cook and serve.

The Bunnings BBQ's are a great source of camaraderie for club members who all seem to enjoy their time cooking and serving customers. It is also provides a great exposure of the club & Rotary to the general public. We obtained one new member this year from a Bunnings BBQ.

Bunnings BBQ occurred on August 12, October 1. December 22, January 26, February 18, April 20, and June 15.

Other Barbeques.

We ran four BBQs using our trailer and two using school on-site facilities. Thanks to Neville and his organising team of Andrew Little, Douglas Lam, and Tom Westcott we participated in the inaugural NAB Run West Festival which returned a net profit of around \$1500. I thank all who participated in this event. We anticipated selling lots of drinks, however, Ronald McDonald House gave away drinks at the next-door stall. We learnt a lot from this exercise the least of which is that our current BBQ trailer needs replacing. Other opportunities are a faster process for cooking eggs, quicker set up and pull down, better signage.

Thanks to Tony Coote and Neville Hansen we ran our first Polling Booth BBQ which returned a nice profit using left over supplies from the NAB Run West. Thank you to all who participated. We now know the procedure to obtain permission to run such a BBQ. All the money has been donated to drought relief.

Project grants. One of the aims this year was to find grants to assist our projects. It requires forward planning to set up projects in the year before doing them to obtain a Rotary grant. We did not achieve this aim, however, we did obtain a Federal Government grant of \$5,000 to renovate our BBQ trailer. We are currently looking at the best way to spend this money and a learning from the NAB Run West Festival BBQ that we ran suggests we should purchase a new trailer. A new trailer supplier has been identified and a proposal is being prepared for the Board.

International

Our International program continued under the leadership of Director Rotarian Peter Stanton who in line with the outcome of the member satisfaction survey found a project in East Indonesia. Peter has visited (at his cost) the area and confirmed that it meets the club's project criteria. A donation of \$5,000 has been made to support a Nusa Tennggara Association East Indonesia Aid (NTA) project funded by a number of Rotary Clubs, the Federal Government Australian Aid program and the Rotary Small Grants program. The project is structured as a subset of the total projects run by NTA, and is an active Rotary World Community Service (RAWCS) project.

The NTA mission is to reduce poverty among rural communities in East Nusa Tenggara, Indonesia

The province of East Nusa Tenggara is just a few hundred kilometres from Australia, but a world away. On average, its people live on less than US\$1 per day, and over a third of the population is affected by malnutrition.

Illiteracy, infant mortality and life expectancy are among the worst in Indonesia. East Nusa Tenggara has a climate more like the seasonal droughts and floods of the Northern Territory than the year-round lushness of Bali or Java. As a result, the people of East Nusa Tenggara (many of whom rely on subsistence agriculture) are faced with harsh conditions for growing crops and raising livestock.



The NTA takes a grassroots approach to supporting the wellbeing of the people of East Nusa Tenggara. They provide small-scale funding and loans to local farming collectives, schools and families to invest in projects that will improve their quality of life and ensure that the essentials of clean water, good schools and productive agriculture are possible for everyone. For example: The NTA assists with the provision of 15 000 litre water tanks and toilets to improve household hygiene, reduce the time burden spent on water collection, and make some water available for animals and vegetables. Beneficiaries help to build these tanks themselves under the tutelage of local experts employed by NTA and using locally purchased materials, ensuring a real sense of community ownership

For several years the club has been supporting Rotarian Anna Papoutsakis



with her project to purchase cows as a form of income for poor families in Central Vietnam. So far we have funded 9 cows as a club and two members have funded three cows. This year we funded Ann, Myra, and Heather, who join Penny, Cherry, Brooke, Pamela, Jill and Gwen.

We provided \$1000 to the Rosie May Foundation's 'Project Hope' to assist with purchasing tuk-tuks to provide an income for single mothers in Sri Lanka. Two club members and their neighbour privately funded a tuk-tuk.

Project Hope has made it its mission to prevent families in distress from



separating. The project is based in the coastal village of Peraliya in South-Western Sri Lanka and offers economic and educational empowerment initiatives for single mothers. As part of these initiatives, Project Hope provide a range of workshops to educate the mothers in simple crafts which they can use to run their own business and, eventually, become economically

independent. These include the production of consumer goods such as rugs and incense sticks as well as the operation of a tuk-tuk driving service. The costs for running the workshops as well as the raw materials for rugs and incense sticks and the tuk-tuk's operational costs are subsidised by the Rosie May Foundation. To maintain an economic incentive system that cultivates a spirit of entrepreneurship and self-responsibility, participants pay a reduced fee for these courses.

Wheelchairs for Kids – a project initiated by the Rotary Club of Scarborough, WA. Wheelchairs For Kids (WFK) is an organisation whose mission is to manufacture and distribute wheelchairs to some of these children assisting them with the means to raise them off the ground from where they are presently confined, and gain a new level of freedom and mobility. Many wheelchairs are actually needed, but every one supplied by WFK makes an enormous difference for one needy child. WFK is made up of a group of retired volunteer members of the Perth metropolitan community in Western Australia. It is a totally volunteer based organisation with no paid staff. It is financed entirely from funds donated by members of the community, many different philanthropic individuals, businesses, clubs, schools, and government bodies. Approximately 340 wheelchairs are produced every month (approximately 3550 per year) and they are then subsequently distributed world wide to these needy children.



End Polio



One hundred and thirty four clubs from the two Sydney Rotary Districts' were encouraged to participate in the "Ride the Train to End Polio". A project initiated by Rotarian Mark Anderson from the Beecroft Club and his son to visit all 187 train stations in the Sydney area in one day and collect money from Rotary Clubs. Our Club donated \$2100 (\$1500 USD). The target was to raise \$1 million. The final count was \$240,000.00 in donations and with the Gates Foundation matching our dollars 2:1 the final amount will come to \$720,000.00!

Marketing and Public Relations

Linda Barrett was unable to take up the role of Director because of family problems and consequently resigned from the club. Our event mangers, along with Carol Russell and President Colin covered a number of relevant functions.

Thanks to Carol we managed to continue to get more articles published in local newspapers and monthly magazines. By my count we had more than 10 articles printed. For example the following article was published in the June edition of the Dooral Roundup.



Neville and Andrew have been posting on Facebook.

We now ask for a gold coin in return for a raffle ticket at the entrance of our events and this gives us valuable information on attendance numbers and details for direct contact to promote our fundraising events. Thanks to Andrew for sending out the multitude of SMS messages.

Thanks to Rosemary we got our drought relief partnership with the Coonabarabran Club published in Rotary Down Under and our book

sale promoted in the District Governor's Newsletter.

The Dural and Round Corner Chamber of Commerce spoke to the club. The organisation's aim is to provide support to the local businesses and publish an annual directory of the local businesses known to them. They also publish a monthly newsletter that covers Cherrybrook and West Pennant Hills, in

which articles about our activities are published. These are expanding gradually and are keen to work with future Rotary events and Rotary members are welcome at networking meetings. As Vocational Director next year I will endeavour to strengthen our relationship.

Tony has been supported by an active committee that meets regularly. We now have a multitude of tools to assist us with locating and retaining new members. Unfortunately, our net membership has declined.

We started the year with 40 members and 1 honorary member. We gained SK Palaniswamy and Adrian Sonego. (SK has relocated to Queensland temporarily and is unsure of his future plans) During the year Charlotte McCartney resigned because of illness and Linda Barrett because of family reasons. We will finish the year with 38 members, plus 1 honorary member.

During the year we completed the following activities-

- A membership survey, and we acted on the findings of the survey, primarily to make our meetings more attractive to potential members.
- Production of banners, flyers and other marketing tools.
- A strong presence on Facebook and in local media thanks to Neville Hansen and Carol Russell.

Youth

We support the Rotary youth programs such as Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA), Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN), National Science Youth Forum and Youth Exchange.

- g) RYLA is a seven-day residential camp where participants are immersed in a program centred around four key themes: Challenge by choice, diversity, community and time out. Young people aged 18-25 are given the opportunity to step away from the distractions of their busy lives and provide the space to think about what is important to them. We sponsored Thomas Hibberd
- h) RYPEN is a an intensive residential weekend, where young people aged approximately 15 to 16 years will develop increased motivation, improved life skills, better self-image, pride in themselves and an understanding of setting and achieving goals. We sponsored Mariah Radovu and Zachary Tchetchenian. The value of RYPEN can be seen from the following message:

Last year you sponsored me so that I could attend the RYPEN (Rotary Youth Enrichment) Summer Camp. At this camp I learnt many invaluable skills and tools that will support me well in my future and that gave me a lot of confidence in communicating, developing team work and leadership skills.

I wanted to advise that based on the skills that I received from this camp, I was successful in becoming part of the School Leadership Team for 2018/2019. I feel that my attendance at this Camp strongly supported my application and I wanted to thank you for giving me this incredible opportunity. I hope that I will be a strong and committed Leader that will make my parents, the school and you all proud.

- i) We also supported the cost of sending a young person to the 10-day National Science Youth Forum. We sponsored Ruairi O'Kane in 2018-19. Michael Bai has been nominated for 2019-20.
- j) We again participated in the Youth Exchange program with both an inbound (Larissa Marcossi) and an out bound (Mikaela Love) student. Larrisa comes from Brazil and joined us in January 2018. Larissa has attended Cherrybrook Technology High School which has a student role a quarter of the population of her home town. Mikaela left last January to learn what it is like to be a student in Denmark and returned in Jan 2019.

Unfortunately we were unable participle in the 2019-20 youth exchange program as we were unable to find host parents, but are hoping to host again in 2020-21.

In August we held a Youth Exchange Reunion put together by Janelle, Rosemary and Tony Coote. Our inbound exchange students present were Louise Lastein (2012-13 from Denmark), Vilde Sollien (2013-14 from Norway), this year's students; Larissa Marcossi from Brazil and Josephine Schevers from Belgium. Josephine is being sponsored by Hills Kellyville and is staying with the Laroumanie's. Also present via video were Aviaaja Isaksen (2015-16 from Greenland), and Maxx Bjorkqvist (2014-15 from Finland) and Beth Ferguson (Club outbound student 2013-14 to Denmark).

We made a donation to sponsor two young people through the Wesley Mission's Operation Hope that gives disadvantaged young people a break from their everyday lives and the opportunity to work on person-centred goals.

Our tradition of presenting achievement prizes for students at West Pennant Hills Public School, Cherrybrook Public School and Cherrybrook Technology High School continued.

In July the Board has agreed to make a \$1000 donation to Michael Weathers' Michael plays for Westbrook AFL juniors and was selected to represent NSW Under 15's Schoolboys Team at the Nationals. Michael's mum passed away after a long fight with cancer and dad, a Fireman, was unable to find funds to send Michael to the Nationals.

We donated \$325 to West Pennant Hills Blowfly Cricket which pays for 5 children with special needs - downs syndrome, wheelchair, blind etc.

Club Treasurer

Our Treasurer this year is Paul Laroumanie who has been assisted while still on training wheels by Tony Coote assisted and Bob Davison. Paul has done a great job making all the books balance – a difficult but very necessary job. The job this year was further complicated by our decision to transfer all our accounts to Bendigo Bank at Galston. Bendigo Bank has accounts specifically to suite charities and their interest rates are slightly better than CBA, and ING which we currently use. Paul has also set up four square readers to replace the EFTPOS terminal that we currently rent from CBA. The CBA terminal has been returned. The square readers cost around the same as the CBA terminal to operate but are much more appropriate for use at our fundraising events. Much of the increase in fundraising revenue this year is attributable to the square readers as many people prefer to use EFTPOS rather than cash.

We passed our financial audit without issue other than as other auditors have noted "That it is difficult to establish controls over the collection of cash sales and donations prior to entry into the financial records". The club has endeavoured to address this issue to the best of its ability through cash

control procedures at fundraising events. We thank Bruce Bartle for agreeing to do our audit pro-bono. Bruce has taken over from Stacey Woon who has returned to New Zealand.

Club Secretary

Secretary Tony Makin is an invaluable officer of the club, keeping the club records up to date and district/RI happy, chairing our meetings and dealing with the multitude of things that keep the club running smoothly.

The introduction of Form 3 for members and partners who have one-on-one contact with children and youth was a trying time. However, we worked through the implementation difficulties helped somewhat by modifications to the content and intent of the form.

In conclusion

In summary our club has made a difference to the lives of many people here in Australia and abroad.

I thank my Board, the many committee members and their partners and all those who have helped in our many projects this year in making my year as President satisfying and rewarding. My thanks also to Anne, who helped tremendously with the workload of a president.
